MA Seminar focus/topic – three main fields of research:

1) various dimensions of dystopian, utopian, speculative, SF, cli-fi and post-apo literature of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries;

2) feminist, gender and queer literature of the 20th and 21st centuries;

3) literary and cultural contexts of rock music and popular culture.

MA Seminar description (what to expect):

Such questions as identity, gender, patriarchy, femininity, masculinity, sexuality, body, sexism, technology, ethnicity, racism, science, religion, power and ideology may be taken under scrutiny. Hence, the suggested topics for research include pursuit of gender/sexual identity, elements of feminisms, features of utopian/dystopian fiction.

These aforementioned three fields of research do not exclude other interesting contemporary phenomena, both literary and cultural, e.g. opiate epidemics in the USA, ethnic minorities in English-speaking countries, the genre of neo-western, gothic and horror fiction.

MA Seminar focus/topic: Discursive Strategies in Public Communication

MA Seminar description (what to expect):

In this seminar, students explore selected areas of public communication (e.g., political propagandas, promotional discourses, marketing and advertising, news and journalism, organizational or institutional websites, social media, blogosphere). The class discussions and readings focus on examples of discursive strategies used by public communicators for the purposes of self-presentation, identity construction, persuasion, manipulation, etc. Students also become familiar with the main research orientations and methods of analyzing public texts (content analysis, semiotic analysis, narrative analysis, rhetorical analysis and discourse analysis) and with exemplary studies in the field. On this basis, students choose the areas for individual research projects. They draw on their knowledge of theories and practices of mediated communication and their ability to apply analytic categories. In their projects, students analyze a sample of freely available texts to answer a research question related to the properties and/or effectiveness of those texts. They explore this in the context of a given theory of communication. The conclusions from their projects may include practical implications.

# Krótki opis / Short description

MA Seminar focus/topic – **Joseph Conrad in Pop Culture, Culture, and Literature** By participating in this seminar, students will have the opportunity to delve into the works of Joseph Conrad and discover how the themes he addresses—such as identity, otherness, morality, and the crisis of civilization—continue to resonate in contemporary culture. By analysing selected works, participants will learn how Conrad's motifs appear in literature, films, video games, and other forms of popular culture. They will also compare classical interpretations with new readings of his work. Together, we will seek answers to the question of what from Conrad's works remains most relevant today and how his writing continues to inspire creators in popular culture.

### **Proposed Thematic Blocks**

# 1. Conrad and Contemporary Issues

- Relevance of themes such as migration, terrorism, and otherness
- Conrad and contemporary Europe: identity crises and cultural tensions
- Conrad in journalistic and media discourse

### 2. Conrad and Popular Culture

- Film and TV adaptations (e.g. Apocalypse Now, The Secret Agent)
- Conradian motifs in video games, comics, and music
- Conrad's characters and archetypes in popular culture

### 3. Conrad and Theory

- Conrad as a modernist writer
- Postcolonial, psychoanalytic, existential readings of Conrad
- Narrative and perspective: Conrad's literary techniques

# 4. Selected Works as Focal Points

- *Heart of Darkness* inspirations and reinterpretations
- *The Secret Agent* terrorism, manipulation, and social anxiety
- Under Western Eyes East and West, politics and ethics
